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THE VISIT OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.

The Prince of Wales remained at Carton until after four o'clock yesterday, when he took his departure in an open carriage and pair, accompanied by Mrs. Bruce, Major-General Bruce, and Colonel Keppel. The royal party arrived at the Hazelhatch station in time for the four o'clock train from Dublin. His Royal Highness and party occupied an ordinary first-class carriage, and proceeded on their way to Newbridge. When the train, however, had arrived within half a mile of the Newbridge station, it came suddenly to a stand still. His Royal Highness, upon inquiry, having ascertained that the piston had broken, and that the train should be detained for some time, immediately got out and walked to the station, where there was a covered carriage awaiting his arrival. He at once proceeded to his quarters at the Carragh. The rain fell in torrents during the greater portion of the day, and a perfect hurricane swept across the deluged plain. All was gloom at the Camp, and no one was to be seen stirring, save the sentinels on duty in the various parts of the Camp. His Royal Highness, it is scarcely necessary to say, did not appear out after his arrival. He dined at his own quarters in the evening.
